The past year brings more stories...stories of impoverished villages and their utter lack of educational resources, but also stories of bustling libraries and grateful communities. From Books to Brilliance (FBTB) remains committed to our mission of providing literacy materials to these under-served communities. In spite of the grinding poverty in which they live, citizens envision a day when their children have choices for a different and better future. They understand that with literacy comes power, and the potential to improve their lives. Thanks to our many kindhearted supporters, we are fortunate to report that FBTB's mission continues here in New Mexico, in Nicaragua, and has expanded into Guatemala.

Nicaragua

Here FBTB's three previously established libraries continue to expand, now providing several villages with access to thousands of books. In addition, Maggie Covill and Brianna Seidlitz did much to transform two of these modest libraries into more inviting and productive

spaces. Local houses typically lack tables and chairs or adequate light to comfortably enjoy a book. A suitable place to read and write is difficult to find. Determined to create a haven for the community's eager readers, Maggie and Brianna purchased child-sized tables and chairs, had bookshelves built and painted the library

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walls in brilliant colors! The children are very enthusiastic about their revitalized libraries, currently the most pleasant places in town. Many children and students arrive daily from nearby villages to read, to do homework, or simply to color. As word of these libraries spreads, we expect to see an ever increasing number of students utilizing the libraries designed just for them! The following is a brief description of each location:

<u>Biblioteca From Books to</u> Brilliance, El Pantanal

Created in 2010 and named by the José de la Cruz Mena Elementary School, teachers currently manage this library. By raising money through local fundraising events, village leaders are planning to hire a full-time librarian. In August, Zoraya Chavarría, one of the school's teachers, accompanied FBTB volunteers to the capital city of Managua to purchase

specific reference books, as well as books of fiction, for their small collection. To express the village's appreciation, a lovely formal presentation of speeches and traditional dances followed. This small library serves the

> many students from El Pantanal's five small schools and some nearby villages.

<u>Biblioteca</u> <u>Paraíso del</u> <u>Niño, El Fortín</u>

Many children refer to this library, founded

in 2009 and housed in the town's community center, as their "second home." Maria Teresa, a well-educated community organizer, oversees this library with the help of several competent high school students. The village of El Fortín is well-known for the incredible progress it has made over the past six years. Seeking help from provinces in Spain and France, the *University* of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, and a local women's cooperative, the town now enjoys potable running water, a sewage system, a bakery, a bridge, and many pastel-painted cement block houses, which replaced cardboard and metal shacks. Given that the library now holds a wide variety of texts, reference books, and fiction, María Teresa is planning for the village's next giant step forward...access to a computer or two! FBTB hopes to support that dream.

<u>Biblioteca Samuel Vidaurre,</u> Mulukukú

Established in the mid-1980s under the watchful eye of Samuel Vidaurre, then the town's only teacher, this library was closed for twenty years after Samuel was killed in the Sandinista Contra War. In 2007 with a grant from the *Dr. Seuss Foundation*, *FBTB* facilitated its reopening with almost a thousand new children's books. The *Maria Luisa Ortiz Women's Cooperative* recently renovated a

its readers. In addition, this library loans educational materials donated by *FBTB* to a local preschool, in an effort to promote early childhood literacy.

Guatemala

In July, *FBTB* also initiated literacy projects in Guatemala, with tremendous assistance from a Rotarian, Mr. Fritz Baaz, also the headmaster of the *Instituto Austríaco Guatemalteco*. The *Instituto* is a very prestigious private school in Guatemala

City. Their accomplished Austrian and Guatemalan teachers not only deliver a first-class education to many urban children, but also engage in educational projects in rural Mayan villages. Though Guatemala has a higher standard of living than Nicaragua, its literacy rate is the lowest of any Spanish speaking country in the western hemisphere. The indigenous Maya, speaking more

than twenty different languages, make up an estimated 51% of the country's population. Spanish is taught in school for those fortunate children that are able to attend. Our Austrian hosts prearranged visits to the villages of El Estor and Santo Tomás. With a matching grant from Rotary eClub of the Southwest USA, FBTB purchased the first books for the two Mayan schools listed below. We plan to expand their collections this year.

With third graders taking copious notes on Mayan musical instruments and sixth graders learning about preclassical Mayan culture, students were eager to learn. New Mexico

Here in New Mexico our work with La Vida Felicidad (formerly *Mosaic*), continues, though under a new name and location due to changes in funding. Nevertheless, this organization that assists people with disabilities now expects to have an even greater reach in the Hispanic and Native American communities. With a yet to be determined location, their library will provide a much needed venue in which to promote early childhood reading and family literacy. FBTB is eager to add to the seven hundred books acquired last year from Mercedez Fruland with Usborne Books and from
